Project Read Aloud Report

My reading Partners were all between the ages of 11 to12, they were going into 6th grade. I got along well with each partner, some would be shy and quiet and others would be more talkative. Some students knew the answers to the questions I was asking them and some did not, therefore I would teach them new things. I chose picture books that appealed to boys and girls of this age, because I had a variety of reading partners.
